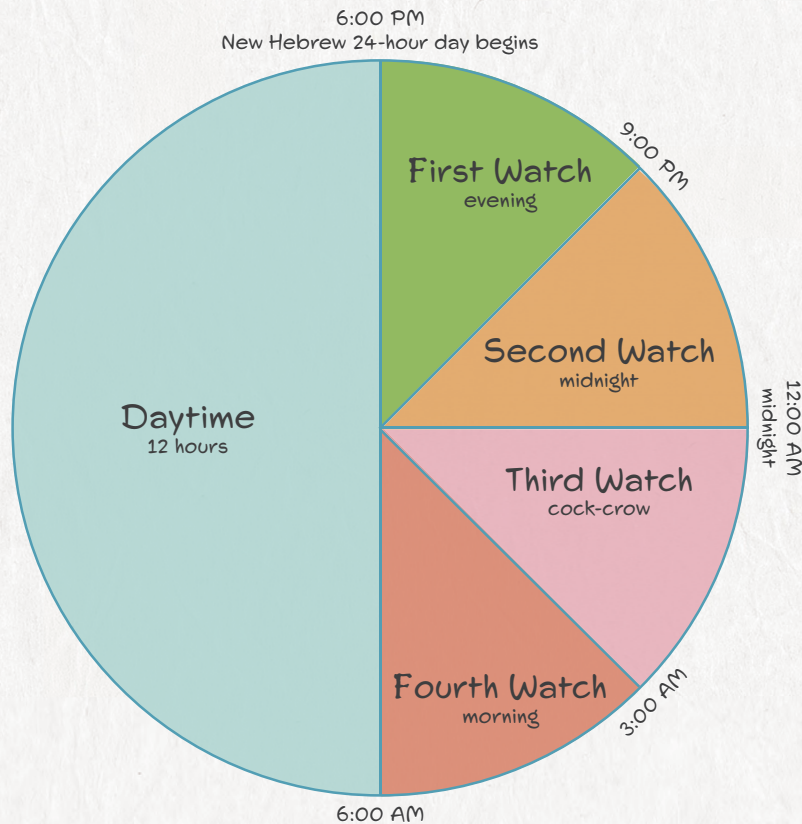

Tip: Start with a light color like yellow, since some colors will be overlapping.

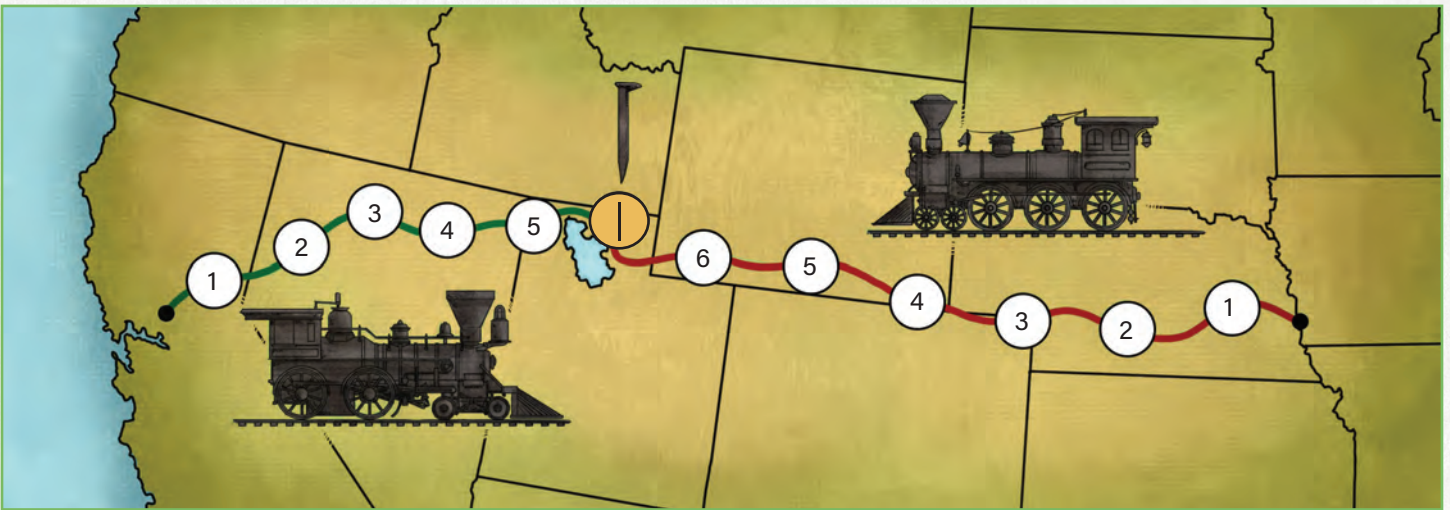

Race to Promontory Summit! Grab a parent or another player for this two-player game. Each of you will need one dice. In order to color in one circle on your side of the map, you need all the supplies listed for your railway company. To gather the necessary supplies, roll your dice as quickly as possible and color in each supply item as you roll the matching number. (Note: You cannot gather supplies for a map circle you are not currently on. You must gather all supplies for Circle 1 before moving on to Circle 2. For example, if you are on Circle 1, you can gather steel rails only for that row, even if you roll a 1 twice. Also notice that the Central Pacific Railroad Company has fewer circles but needs dynamite to blast through the rough terrain.)

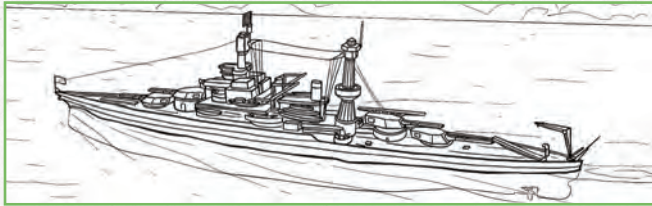

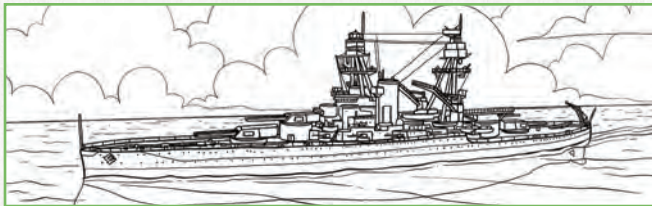
Many of the battleships that were damaged or destroyed during the attack on Pearl Harbor were named after states. See if you can unscramble the letters to figure out the name of each battleship below.



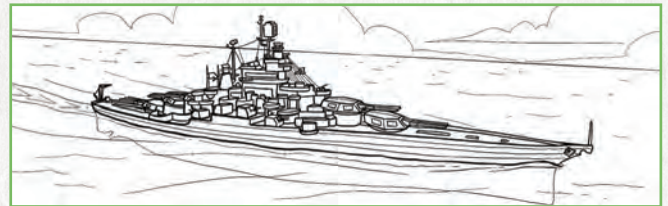

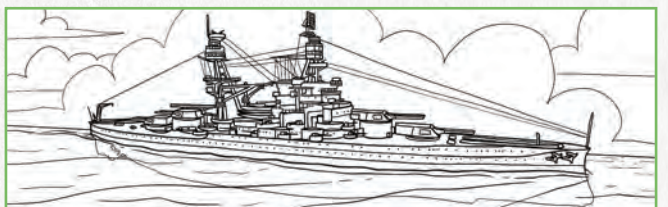
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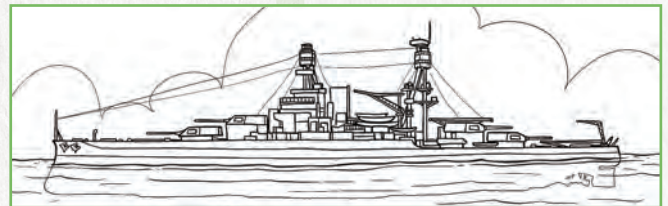
